2. Welcome

The Chair welcomed members and the public to the meeting. David introduced each of the seven Trustees.

3. Annual Report

The Chair presented the Annual Report, highlighting progress over the past year under the following key outcome measures:

Growth

Since the last AGM, membership has grown to 35 organisations with an interest in heritage (including four new members who will be formally welcomed at this meeting).

Oral History Project

- The Oral History repository continues to expand (see report from the Oral History Manager below).
- Additional funding has been received this year for the continuation of the project: \$9,500 from the
 Lotteries Environment & Heritage Fund and the second tranche of funding from the Central Lakes Trust.
- A full-day oral history training workshop was held, resulting in 16 new volunteers.

Heritage Talks Programme

The Heritage Talks programme remains highly popular, attracting large audiences to community events.

Quarterly Newsletter and Digital Engagement

- Quarterly newsletters, available in both booklet and digital formats, serve as an important channel for sharing membership updates, heritage news, and events, keeping the wider community informed about the significance and value of heritage in the district.
- Social media and the COHT website continue to be key tools for promoting upcoming events, heritage funding opportunities, and council initiatives.

Supporting the Museum Sector

• Continued support for the museum sector is provided by having a Heritage Trust representative (Maggie Hope) on the Central Otago Museums Trust Board.

<u>Advocacy</u>

On behalf of our members, the Trust continues to advocate for the preservation and enhancement of heritage both locally and nationally, through submission processes:

- A submission to the Government on the proposed Fast Track Bill, urging the identification of potential
 heritage site losses and the inclusion of qualified heritage experts on Advisory Panels to mitigate the
 impact of development on heritage sites.
- A submission to the final hearing on the CODC Heritage Precinct Guidelines. This milestone reflects a long
 journey toward formally recognizing the unique architectural characteristics of each of our five heritage
 precincts and providing property owners with clear guidance on how new builds and large-scale
 renovations can enhance and reflect these characteristics.
- A submission to the CODC in October, advocating for the Council to ring-fence a finite pot of funding and property support for the Central Otago Museum sector, and for this funding to be allocated by the Council on a three-year Long Term Planning cycle.

Future Direction

• In the coming months, the Trust will work alongside the Council to prepare for the consultation process required to update the heritage provisions in the District Plan. This consultation is long overdue, as it has been 12 years since the *Towards Better Heritage Outcomes* consultation document was developed with the community. This feedback is vital for guiding the Trust's strategic direction and informing the development of a combined Arts, Culture, and Heritage Strategy for the District.

7. New Member Presentations:

Clyde Primary School

Kate Goodfellow highlighted her interest in history and heritage, as well as the opportunities for engaging primary school students with Central Otago's heritage. She shared an excerpt from a film in which new entrant students reenacted the historic Clyde robbery, a story featured at the Clyde Museum. The film was based on *The Tale of Parker and Cunningham* and its accompanying book. Haehaeata Natural Heritage Trust

Frances Anderson provided an update on their activities, noting:

- The lack of biodiversity in Central Otago due to land use changes from historical activities (fire, mining, farming) and the Trust's work in raising awareness of the benefits of dryland native biodiversity, which is a key aspect of their work program.
- The Trust's Clyde Railhead Community Eco-Nursery, which propagates locally sourced native plants for planting projects.
- Native planting sites at Flat Top Hill and other sites.
- Partnerships with community groups, such as the Clyde Community & Enviroschools Restoration Group, the Lower Manorburn Working Group, and Keep Alexandra Beautiful.

8. Other Member Updates

Central Otago Museums' Trust

Jane Lancaster, Independent Chair of the Trust, gave an update on their activities including the Museums 100 Project which launched in October. The funding received from the Ministry for Culture and Heritage for this project enabled vital training for museum staff and volunteers. From photography and cataloguing to digitisation, storytelling and exhibition display techniques. The exhibition runs until April 2025. Jane thanked COHT for their support with Trust activities.

Central Otago Oral History Group

Project Manager, Joanna Leigh, provided an update on the project:

- There are now 119 oral histories in the repository, with 45 published online.
- Significant progress has been made in improving interview sound quality, using Artificial Intelligence (AI) to filter out unwanted background noise.
- Joanna played a short excerpt of an interview with Rosie Turnbull, the great-granddaughter of Charles
 Henry Wong Gye, who was an interpreter for the Chinese during the Dunstan Gold Rush. This interview

9. Election of Trustees

David Ritchie noted that the Trustees chose to update the plan rather than undertake a full review. It is hoped that the consultation process required to update the heritage provisions in the CODC District Plan, scheduled for early next year, will help inform the COHT Strategic Direction. David also mentioned that this consultation process could ideally assess the benefits of the Council and the community developing a broader arts, culture, and heritage strategy for the district.
